NC POS:To understand the work of famous artists, describing similarities and differences between different practises and disciplines, and making link to their own work.

Concept: Who was Pablo Picasso and why was he famous for drawing?

Key vocabulary:Picasso, drawing, history, cubism, portrait, linear, scumbling, feathering, side stroke, technique, influenced by/inspired by.

Prior learning: Children have looked at and created their own patterns, prior knowledge of primary colours and they have previously assessed their own work, abstract art, pencil grip.

Core knowledge: In depth study

What is drawing?

• Can children explain what drawing is?

Who was Pablo Picasso?

- Who was Picasso and why was he important?
- Why was he famous?
- What can we find out about his life?
- What inspired him to become an artist?
- What is his most significant piece of art?
- How does his art reflect and shape our history?

Exploring ways to make different textures using pencils

- Can children create different types of lines?
- Can they use a variety of drawing techniques such as linear, side stroke, scumbling and feathering?
- Can they compare the similarities and differences with regard to the texture?

Picasso's portraits

- Do they understand what a portrait is?
- Why did Picasso draw portraits?
- Explore Picasso self-portrait. What do they notice about the colours, texture and lines?
- Can they identify the content (what it is), form (light/dark), process (how it is made) and mood (feelings created)?
- Explore how his self-portraits changed over time why? What do they notice about his artwork?

Portraits applying the techniques of drawing

- Can they create their own portraits using the techniques of linear, side stroke, feathering and scumbling?
- Can they compare the differing textures?

Cubism

- What is cubism and how has it reflected/shaped our history?
- Can they explore an example of Picasso's artwork (The Weeping Woman and The Sailor) and identify the content (what it is), form (light/dark), process (how it is made) and mood (feelings created)?
- What is the picture of?

- Why has he used those specific colours? What do you notice about the colours in cubism

portraits?

• How has he used lines? How many different types of lines?

Creating their own cubism portrait

- Can they create their own cubism portrait using the techniques taught and their knowledge of cubism?
- Can they use oil-pastels to colour their portraits effectively?
- Can they evaluate their artwork and compare similarities and differences to Picasso's The Weeping Woman or The Sailor?
